Report on Annapoorna Yojana (APY)

The department conducts extension work projects involving social issues and development of skills among the students. One such project offered by DLLE is the Annapoorna Yojana (APY) and its objective is to make students understand the concept of small-scale business and increase the self-reliance approach. Two training programs are conducted for the students yearly. In the first training program, students are oriented by teachers. During the training, teachers provide insight into the activities to be conducted in the first term for the Annapoorna Yojana (APY) activity, as well as brief them on the format of the report to be submitted by the students at the end of the year in second term training. 30 students from various streams participated in Annapoorna Yojana (APY) in the year 2021-22.

Under this project, students organize twenty-five sales (items to be sold can be food items or non-food items) either weekly or on alternate days on the college campus or nearby area or at the functions (Modes – Online, stalls, by order). They must keep an account of the cost incurred, sale proceeds, calculate profit/loss, etc. The students maintain a record in the below format.

The projects are then checked by In-charge teachers and then by Course Coordinator appointed by the University of Mumbai.

Status of women in India

The status of women in India has undergone many great changes over the past few Millennia- from a a largely unknown status in ancient times through the low points of the medieval period, to the promotion of equal rights in recent decades. In the ancient time the primary duty of women was service to one's husband. Scholars, however, believe that in ancient India, women enjoyed equal status with men in all fields of life.

Works by ancient Indian Grammarians such as Patanjali and Katyayana suggest that woman were educated in the early Vedic period. Rigvedic verses suggest that the woman married at a mature age and where probably free to select dear husband Gargi and Maitreyi where notable women stages mention in in scriptures such as Rig Veda and upanishads.

According to study the status of women begin to decline with the smritis especially manusmriti. The Islamic invention and later Christianity curtailed women freedom and rights. Although reformatory movement such as Jainism allowed women to be admitted to the the religious order by and large the woman in India face confinement and restrictions. Sati, child marriage and a ban on Widow remarriages became part of social life in India.

The Muslim conquest in the Indian subcontinent brought the purdah practise in the Indian society. Among the Rajput of Rajasthan, the Jauhar was practice. In some parts of India the Devadasis all the temples women were sexually exploited. In many Muslims families women were restricted to zenana areas.

In spite of this conditions they were as some women expelled in the field political, literature, education and religion. Prominent among them Razia Sultan,

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Chand Bibi, Mirabai, Akka Mahadevi, Rami Janabai and Lai Ded. Some bhakti sects and Guru Nanak preached the message of equality between men and woman.

During the British Raj, many reformers such as Ram Mohan RoyRoy, Ishwar ChandraChandra Vidyasagar, Jyotirao Phule etc; fought for the Upliftment of the womenwomen. Raja Ram Mohan Roy's efforts led to the abolition of the sati practice in 1829. Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar Cursed for the improvement in conditions of widows led to the widow remarriage at of of 1856. Many women reformers such as Pandita Ramabai also have the causes of women upliftment. Rani Lakshmibai Bhai and Begum Hazrat Mahal notable women who led the the revolt of 1857. Women also played and important part in India's Independence struggle some of the famous freedom fighters include Sarojini Naidu, Dr Annie Besant, Vijayalakshmi Pandit, Rajkumari Amrit Kaur, Aruna Asaf Ali, Sucheta kriplani and Durgabai Deshmukh, Chandramukhi Basu, Kadambini Ganguly and Anandi Gopal Joshi where few of the earliest Indian women to obtain educational degrees.

In modern india, traditions search as Sati, Jauhar and Devdasi have been banned and are largely defunct. However, the purdah is still practiced by many Indian women, and child marriage remains prevalent despite it begins and illegal practice under current Indian laws. Women now participate in all the activities such as education, politics, media, art and culture, services sector, Science and Technology etc.

The constitution of India guarantees to all Indian women equality (Article 14),no discrimination by the state (Article 15 (1)),equality of opportunity (Article 16) and equal pay for equal work (Article 39(d)), In addition, it allows special provisions to be made by the state in favour of women and children (Article 15(3)), renounces practices derogatory to the dignity of women (Article 51(A) \in), and also allow for provisions to be made by the state for securing just and humane conditions of work and for Maternity relief (Article 42).



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
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The feminist activism in India picked up the momentum during 1970s, which forced the government to amend the evidence act, The Criminal Procedure Code and the Indian penal code and introduced the category of custodial rape. Female activists a united over issues such as female infanticide, gender bias, women health, and female literacy. Many women groups launched anti- liquior campaign in Andhra Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Haryana, Orissa, Madhya Pradesh and other States.

In 1990s grants from foreign donor agencies enable the information of new Women- Oriented NGOs. Self help groups and NGO search as Self Employed Women's Association (SEWA) have played a major role in women's right. Many women including Medha Patkar (Narmada Bachao Andolan) have emerged as leaders of local movement. The most prominent Indian women are Indira Gandhi, Pratibha Patil and Mira Kumar the trio holds the distinction of being the Prime Minister, President and Speaker of the lok sabha respectively.

The steady change in the position of women can be highlighted by looking at what has been achieved buy women in the country since independence. In 1951 Prem Mathur become the first Indian women commercial pilot of the deccan Airways. In 1959 Anna Chandy became the first Indian woman judge of a Kerala High Court. In 1972 Kiran Bedi became the first female recruit to join the Indian police service.

In 1984 Bachendri Pal became the first Indian women to climb Mount Everest. In 1989 Justice M Fatima beev become the first woman judge of the supreme court of India. In 1993 Priya Jhingan became the first woman to be commissioned into the Indian Army. In 1994 Harita Kaur Deolbecome the first Indian woman pilot in the Indian Air Force (IAF), on a solo flight. In 2000 Karnam Malleswari became the first indian woman to win an olympic medal.

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The year 2001 is seen as landmark as it was declared the year of woman employment (swashakti) by the government of india. The National Policy for the Empowerment of woman was also passed the same year. Two states are Kerala and Mizoram have attained universal female literacy rates. In urban Indian, girls are nearly at par with the boys in terms of education.

As regards workforce participation, contrary to the common perceptions, a large percent of women in India work. In Urban India, women have impressive number in the workforce and are at par with their male counter parts in term of wages and positions at the workplace. In fact, 30% of the work force in software industry is female. In rural India, agriculture and allied industrial sector employ almost 90% of the total female labor.

In overall farm production, women's average contribution is estimated at around 60% of the total labour. Women account for more than 90% of the total employment in diary production in India. They also constitute 50% of the total employed in the forest- based small-scale Enterprises.

Woman are not born, but made. What better than india to exemplify this statement by simone de Beauvoir. With the whole world celebrating International Women's Day with the great pomp and show, it would be only apt to analyse the position and space indian woman occupy today, and comparing it to the 60 years ago when the country had just gained independence. 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There have been innumerable debates about gender in India over the years. Much of it includes women positioning in society, their education, health, economic position, gender equality, etc. What one can conclude from such as discussion is that women have always held a certain paradoxical position in our developing country.

While on one hand, india has seen an increased percentage of literacy and now entering professional fields, the practices of female infanticide, poor health conditions and lack of education still persisting still continue. Even the patriarchal ideology of the home being a women real domain and marriage being her ultimate destiny hasn't charged much. The matrimonial advertisement demanding girls of the same caste, with fair skin and slim figure, or the much criticised fair and lovely ads, are indicators of the slow changing social mores. If one looks at two sides of women the and now, one has to look at two sides of the coin; one side which is promising, and one side which is bleak.

When our country got it's independent the participant of woman nationalist was widely acknowledged when the indian constitution was formulated, it granted equal rights to women, considering them legal cds n o p country and as any wool to men in terms of the freedom band opportunity. The sex ratio of women at this time was slightly better than what it is todaytoday, standing at 945 females per 1000 males. Yet the condition of women screamed a different reality.

There were relegated to the house hold, and made to submit to the male-dominated patriarchal society, as has always been prevalent in our countrycountry. Indian women who fought as equals with men in the nationalist strugglestruggle, we're not given that free public space anymore. Women were reduce to being second class citizens. The national female literacy rate was an alarmingly low 8.6%. The Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) for girl was 24.8% at primary level and 4.6%at the upper primary level (in the 11-14 yrs age group). There existed insoluble social and culture barrier to education of women and access to organize schooling.
